Report subject: Public Space Protection Orders (PSPO) Consultation - Dog Control

South Hams District Council is currently reviewing their Dog Control Public Space Protection Order (PSPO).

PSPOs are a tool available to councils under the Anti-Social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014. They are intended to deal with a particular nuisance or problem in a specific area that's causing a detrimental effect on the local community.

They work by imposing conditions on the use of that area that will apply to everyone.

Currently, South Hams District Council has a PSPO in place relating to the control of dogs. It covers things like:

- Dog Fouling
- Where you must have your dog on a lead
- Penalties for not putting a dog on a lead if you are asked to do so by an authorised officer of the Council
- Where dogs are not permitted at any time
- Which beaches you can take your dog on and when

 - Car Parks
 - Cemeteries and Churchyards
 - Any fenced, hedged or walled pond, area of water or nature reserve
 - Marked sports fields while organised sport is in progress
 - · Areas stated as formal gardens, and
 - Specifically the site known as Courtenay Park, Salcombe.
